Become a Board Member of the League of Women Voters Saint Paul

The St. Paul LWV is currently recruiting Board members to fill new terms on its Board for the 2018-19 League year (June 1-May 31). Because we are a volunteer-run organization, our board members lead and participate in various committees to plan and coordinate our events and initiatives. Board members are given the flexibility to choose the committees and activities that interest them the most, while also considering what work needs to be done to help the League reach its goals. The upcoming Board term will be an exciting one—not only is the League approaching its 100th year anniversary in 2020 but the St. Paul League will be hosting the LWVMN (State League) convention in 2019. There is no better time to join!

Qualifications: We seek individuals (of all genders) from the St. Paul area who are passionate about helping Saint Paul citizens make democracy work. Board members must commit to a one- or two-year term as well as to attending the 2-hour Board meetings held monthly except in July and December. Board members must also commit to working on a particular project (membership, voter service, etc.). The choice usually is negotiable. If you are interested in joining the Board in a well-defined role, we're looking for a Board member to fill the Secretary position for the coming year. This role can be split between two Board members, if desired. Previous Board experience is not required.

Collett, Professor of Law at University of Saint Thomas School of Law and Matthew Filner, Professor of Political Science at Metropolitan State University.

VOTER SERVICE UPDATE

We are working on voter service events, which are in the planning stage. We're partnering with the St. Paul Library to host three Voter Registration/Ice Cream Social events this summer. The first will be at Sunray Library in July, and the others are tentatively at Rice Street and Riverview Libraries. These are all indoor/ outdoor events. Volunteers are needed for planning and to be at the events.

Second, we're working to expand outreach by posting voter information in libraries, community centers, schools and colleges for a start. We'll follow up by including public housing, community health clinics, as well as faith and immigrant communities. The Secretary of State (SOS) office is providing colorful posters. Ideas and help on this would be appreciated.

We continue to do registration at St. Paul College, and will expand to include other colleges. The St. Paul High School Program will likely be merged with the SOS program that intends to do mass registrations at school assemblies in May using iPads.

ATTEND THE LWVUS CONVENTION IN CHICAGO

Are you interested in attending the LWVUS Convention in Chicago this summer? The National Convention will be held Thursday, June 28, through Sunday, July 1, at Hilton Chicago. ATTEND THE LWV MN CONVENTION IN SAINT CLOUD

Registration is now open for the State League's convention April 27-28 at Courtyard by Marriot in Saint Cloud. The convention offers opportunities for leadership development and a chance for members of various local LWVs to meet League members from the other parts of the state.

The weekend will begin Friday April 27 in the evening with a welcome social at the hotel. Saturday will start with a buffet breakfast and meeting before breaking out in smaller groups for the remainder of the day. A total of nine sessions will be offered, to choose three from. Advocacy, MLD, and Voter Service board chairs will present and there will also be facilitated local LWV round tables. LWV Minnesota staff will also be available for technical assistance.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

The school shooting tragedy in Florida and the public response through protests and marches had social media afire in February, and our league members were stirred up with questions about how to be involved. Several noted the involvement of the students as a potential turning point in the discussion about gun violence, and how our youth voter registration efforts may offer a way to help them affect change. This discussion also led us to review our public policy positions from the bottom up.

LWVSP does not have a specific policy position on gun control and gun violence. Our policy positions focus on local governance and its issues. However as a local league, we concur with the LWV US' policy positions on both violence prevention and gun control, which are:

- Violence Prevention Support violence prevention programs in communities.
- Gun Control Protect the health and safety of citizens through limiting the accessibility and regulating the ownership of handguns and semiautomatic weapons. Support regulation of firearms for consumer safety.

MARCH FOR OUR LIVES

There are a number of league members who have voiced interest in participating in the March for Our Lives on March 24, 2018. The event begins at 9 a.m., when people start convening on Harriet Island. The student-led march organizers have asked LWV to conduct voter registration before, during and after the rally. If you are interested in being a part of the LWV MN voter registration "mobile" effort, please email Paula Stein Clark at pistein@comcast.net and put "VR on 24th" in the subject header. If you are unable to join the LWV MN group, adults and allies are asked to go directly to the rally at the Capitol (the rally starts at 11 a.m.) in order to ensure space for youth organizing on Harriet Island. LWV MN also has a position on violence and firearms, which is even more extensive than the national position. So, what does this all mean for us as local members? Basically, it means that we can organize contingents, under the banner of LWVSP, to participate in marches or protest activities, like the gun violence march, as long as it conforms to our organizational policy positions and our local board leadership is informed and approves.

All of <u>LWV US's public policy positions</u> are available on the LWV website. <u>Our public policy positions</u> (and links to state and national positions) are also available <u>on the LWVSP website</u>. This is an important section of our website, and I encourage all members to review its contents, and certainly bring questions to the Board regarding this important part of our work.

As a final note, League believes it can best effect change through our core mission of voter registration and participation: registering as many voters as possible and getting them out to vote for their issues and interests. The gun violence issue has momentum now, and it is heartening to see some change being implemented in Florida and being debated closer to home in Minnesota. Our task remains to help voters make their voices heard.
